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being prepared for over 100 sanctuary seekers who will be coming together in Llangynidr in October.

5. **Minor Injuries Unit Changes in Nevill Hall** – Information has been shared with the Clerk about the changes in Nevill Hall Minor Injuries. The quick headline is changing from 24 hour service to an 18 hour service which is nurse led. 6. **Bus Shelter** – I would be very keen to continue to talk to the Community Council about a bus shelter for Llangattock. It has been challenging getting costs out of Highways but they are committed to providing the information and carrying out the work. Some wooden designs have been shared with the Community Councillors and awaiting the costs which are being requested from the Bus Shelter manufacturer.
7. **My Dentist** – I’m getting some challenging case work on the problems with My Dentist now only providing for private patients. It would seem people have been asked to join an insurance scheme at £16 per month which is not easy in this time of a cost-of-living crisis. If you hear of any cases, then please do ask them to get in touch.
8. **Flood Resilience Project** – There has been excellent feedback and activity for the Flood Resilience Project across Powys and specifically in Llangattock. Thanks to Cllr Kate and Cllr Gail for all their help and support which kept people informed. There is not enough money to deliver on all the needs requested but surveys have been carried out on every household and there is a plan to apply for more funding which could be supported.
9. **The Full Powys County Council Meeting** – the full council meeting will be held in Llandrindod and full details of the agenda can be found here closer to the meeting which is on 5th October 2023.

Safer at 20

From 17 September 2023, the default 20mph speed limit will come into force on roads where people work and play in Powys, and across Wales.

Where you see streetlights, you should assume that the speed limit is 20mph – unless there are signs saying otherwise.

The Welsh Government has changed the default speed limit to make streets safer and ensure our communities see:

- Fewer collisions and serious injuries
- More people walking and cycling
- Improved health and wellbeing

Deputy Minister for Climate Change, with responsibility for transport, Lee Waters said: “The evidence around the world is very clear – reducing speed limits reduces collisions and saves lives. Slower speeds help create a safer and more welcoming community, giving people the confidence to walk and cycle, improving their health and wellbeing whilst protecting the environment.”

“The Welsh Government have taken a bold move to implement the new 20mph default speed limit across the country,” explains Cllr Jackie Charlton, Cabinet Member for a Greener Powys, “but the benefits we hope to see around slower driving speeds, improved safety and increased levels of cycling and walking go a long way to outweigh any reluctance for change.

“The new 20mph speed limit will also complement our increasing network of active travel routes across the county, where we encourage people to make short, local journeys on foot or bicycle, rather than the car. It is especially hoped that more Powys families

Report from the Planning and Environment Committee for Full Council agreement (Cllr K Inglis) and any Motions for the Full Council to Consider

Minutes of the 4th July were approved.

ENVIRONMENT

- **Hedging Beechwoods/Allotments** - Cllr G Jones is completing the application for this for the boundary between the Rec Ground and Allotments.
- **Mountain Road** – The committee received an encouraging reply from Catherine Mealing-Jones of BBNPA. We need to report livestock deaths, as currently they are not reported. Record the evidence and let Cllr Charlton know. Cllr J Charlton has requested the GoSafe van to come and monitor, LCC Clerk to follow-up.
The committee discussed the possibility of the Council obtaining funding to install speed cameras and possibly monitor noise levels too. One to add to the future project list. (copy of letter available if any Councillors wish to see it)
- **Enhancing Common Land with Trees** – Reply received from Pryor & Ricketts. They are saying that the “Enhancing Common Land” project has concluded and was not in-depth. Consultation at present is focussed on graziers who they will be meeting in early October, where they will be asked the question “As graziers, how would you like to enhance Llangynidr & Llangatwg Commons with grazing, peat restoration and tree planting” Cllrs J Rees & G Dobbs to update on any developments. (copy shared)
- **THINK Transport Application** – We have been successful with this application and have been awarded the £2K to research a potential community bus for the 6 councils area. We have our first meeting with the Aberystwyth THINK team on Thursday 28th September. Simon Walters of LGV will support. Also two residents are involved in looking at transport now through the Place plan process, so these can link up. There is also a link with the Race to Zero group and BBNPA.
- **LGV - Five Councils - Environment Meeting – Sept 18th**
LGV spoke about Race to Zero ongoing projects of Energy, Food & Transport and their recent meeting with Llanelly Council, who would like to be involved in the Race to Zero group. Members of CTC and Vale of Grwyney attended. Claire Hall of CTC spoke about their stakeholder group meeting on Thurs 21st.
- **Website** - Cllr K Inglis has drafted two new topic sections, one on Emergencies and one on Environment. Before this goes live, Full Council will be required to approve the additions, hopefully at either the October or November meeting.
- **Slow the Flow – update** – On the 14th Sept, Cllrs K Inglis & G Jones met with Sian Mercer and James Hawkins from the Wye & Usk Foundation, along with Bob Vaughan (Ex NRW) to visit the Waun Ddu raised bog and the source and route of the Onneu Fach. The funding is imminent and they want to progress to mapping the area and looking at hydrological flows etc. They spoke of how there would be a residents meeting at some point and that they have a farm advisor who visits landowners to discuss the project. ***Cllr K Inglis & resident Mr G Smith also visited with Mr J Pritchard on 11th Sept, to inform him about the visit and to invite him along. Mr Pritchard is currently very unreceptive to this idea on his land and any advice from other Councillors is welcome. It would be a shame to miss out on such an opportunity.***
- **PCC Quarterly Flood meeting – 20th September**
A number of LCC residents issues to be discussed. Cllrs G Jones & K Inglis to attend.

Report from the Central Services for Full Council agreement and any Motions for the Full Council to Consider (Cllr G Jones)

Motion: to approve the submission of a grant application to BB Local Places for Nature project for funding to maintain the boundary hedge between the Recreation Ground and the allotments with a natural laid hedge and allowing volunteers to watch and help where appropriate and safe to do so.

Committee last met on Thursday 20th July, 2023

It was a **very** busy summer for Central Services. A quick summary

- Richard looked after outside tap (which is padlocked) so the primary school children could have their end of school year water fight.
- We arranged 3 trial visits to the park for Wally the Waffle Van and one for the Jacket Potato lady. These proved popular midweek during the summer holidays. Several enquiries received verbally to ask if they will continue as well as Jacket Potato Lady formally requesting another date to serve from the shelters. Future pop-up events on the tarmac will be discussed at Central Services Committee on Thursday next week (it has been pushed back a week) but welcome to hear feedback as well from other councillors.
- The public toilet refurbishment works Phase 1 were already underway and then completed. Thank you to LAS for doing and Richard for project managing. Phase 2 is due to commence shortly.
- Llangattock Village Society kept the park litter free and cleared some drains in the village centre which had been blocked and covered up for some time.
- Cllrs Richard Jones and Tim Jones met with Sam Harpur, BB's Woodland Consultant and liaised with The Plas owners to keep the public footpaths in the Plas fields/meadows clear.
- Richard arranged for the contractor Mr T Adams to tidy up the cemetery and compost areas and remove saplings growing in graves as highlighted in Gwyn's July Asset Tour and general TLC needed around the cemetery shed. Thank you, it's looking much better.
- More graffiti found on the new sign by the accessible gate to the Beechwood. We now have some non-hazardous cleaner to try when the weather cheers up.
- Cllr G Jones and the Clerk had a site visit walkabout with **Peninsula Services** who are taking over the heavy admin on asset H&S and HR management to give them a better idea of what we have and how we manage it all.
- Cllr G Jones and the Clerk met with the operative from DragonPlay who were finally able to source a new zipwire and traveller seat and install it. We had initial conversations with them regarding ongoing regular inspections of the zipwire, which he appeared to be prepared to do since he knew how it was put together. We felt this could be a better option than a visual check by councillors and will discuss further at Central Services.

- (See Tree Survey 23 Plan in Google Drive) The Tree Condition Survey for 2023 has been published. It needs to be looked at more closely in Committee, however, highlights are that more trees (highlighted in pink) are on the monitor list, and more immediate attention highlighted in yellow - one smaller tree in the park needs to be felled and a heavy limb from a large oak near the basketball hoop needs to be removed. I shall add the trees to be monitored to the Asset Tour checklist.
- And finally we accommodated the ITV Film Crew at the park shelters for a few days while they filmed on location. Very happy to see the shelters finding another use and the toilets were made available out of normal hours. A disturbance donation of £850 was received which is being put towards the new play equipment fund.

A big Thank You to Richard for always being there and fixing everything and having the right keys to do it, and Llangattock Village Society for coordinating all the volunteer effort over the summer.

Thank you also to Gwyn for the July Asset Tour, Julian is next on the list.

Motion: see flyer -BB Nature Recovery (Hedges) Grant in Google Drive

To refresh memories Julian and I met with BB's Ecologist Jonathan Davies and Maria Golightly (BB's Local Places for Nature) about opportunities to apply for grant funding in support of nature recovery. Julian identified the chain link fence boundary between the Recreation Ground and allotments as ideal for restoring a natural boundary in the form of a laid hedge. Many of the shrubs are now trees and large gaps in between have grown.

There would be a cost involved in engaging a hedge-layer, removing the chain link fence, reducing overall height, infill planting with appropriate trees & shrubs. These costs will be calculated with Julian's help. It has been suggested that a hedge-laying masterclass with community engagement with volunteers could be organised and there were some willing voices from LACAS to provide this.

I have had a formal chat with Maria about the grant details and am happy to complete and take it forward should the motion be carried.

The motion: Full Council is to approve the submission of a grant application to BB Local Places for Nature for funding to restore the natural boundary (laid) hedge between the Recreation Ground and allotments; allowing volunteers to watch and help where appropriate and safe to do so.

Proposed: Cllr H Burns **Seconded:** Cllr K Inglis **Resolved:** the full council carried the motion and instructed Cllr G Jones to take this application forwards.

Place Plan Steering Group Report for Full Council agreement and any Motions required (Cllr T Jones)

Since Council last met, the following actions have been taken:

- 154 detailed responses have been collected on survey #1
- 187 residents have been signed up to the Council's mailing list
- Two meetings of the Place Plan working group have been held
- LCC has held a pop-up event at the LACAS produce show
- Small-area consultations organised by residents and Councillors have been held in Park Drive, Beaufort Avenue/Beechwood Road, Dardy, Legar and Ffawyddog and we have dates for further ones at Clos Cillau/Plas Derwen/Tan Derwen (5pm-7pm 20th at the community hall) and St Catwgs Church on the 25th. There are no dates yet for Lime Trees, the main road through the village, or Hillside. These small area events have been important because most of those attending had not either filled

out the survey or attended the public meeting. As part of this process, each area has been leafleted by hand and notices placed on the noticeboards.

- Photographs have been posted and a newsletter created to thank residents and advertise further opportunities to engage.
- A data group led by residents has been examining data from the Office of National Statistics, Welsh Index of Multiple Deprivation and Powys.
- A Matrix of Community Concerns has been set up which collates issues raised by residents and divides them by how they are best dealt with e.g. in the place plan, as part of LCC's 5-year plan or by passing the comments to other responsible bodies.
- Some issues which warranted immediate attention have been dealt with or passed to the appropriate bodies.
- Cllr H Burns has attended an affordable housing seminar
- Meetings with stakeholders have taken place.
- A meeting has been arranged for Tim to address the governors of Llangattock Church in Wales Primary School.
- Resident-led groups have been set up to examine existing planning policies and future 'pipeline' projects which may support or limit community ambitions
- Approaches have been made to Crickhowell High School with a view to getting more young people involved.
- Cllr Kate Inglis attended an online 5-Councils place plan consultation.
- Approaches have been made to Powys County Council Highways and Bannau Byrcheiniog to discuss those constraints.
- Cllr T Jones has spoken to grant funders and planning consultants in case we need professional help to evidence some of our plans.
- Since the consultation started, more than 30 hours have been spent in direct consultations with residents and many multiples of that planning, communicating and collating the responses.
- We have not, however, been able to reach many young people and some areas of our community.

CLEAR THEMES EMERGING

Llangattock has a rapidly ageing population, with high levels of economic inactivity, where high house prices are preventing young people staying in or moving into the community. There is a very limited stock of small homes and a much larger stock of larger homes occupied by single older people or couples. Residents value the peace and quiet, the work done on the recreation ground but are concerned about access to services including a shop/post office, safe travel routes, public transport, the speed and volume of traffic and parking in particular areas at certain times. There is concern that the number of holiday lets in the centre of the community is hollowing-out the village and that Llangattock will turn into a retirement village devoid of life which would have wide impacts, including on the primary school roll. There is a strong feeling in favour of 'no change' but do people need to focus more on their children and their grandchildren's futures?

Motion: That this Council wishes to establish working groups with residents to explore the following issues:

Green Transport:

- Active Travel, safer walk and cycle ways, safe access to the Ffawyddog, route round the cobbles in the centre of the village, improving the kissing gates and bridge over the Usk. Direct route from Tan Derwen to Park Drive.

- Limiting Traffic Speed, volume and traffic calming. Regulate through-traffic.
- Public Transport + improved links to Crickhowell and beyond, frequency and reliability + more areas covered
- E-shuttle bus + other green transport including for Dardy + Ffawyddog
- Parking (on-street enforcement, off-street parking, residents + visitors)

Affordable Housing

- For local first-time buyers
- For local older people downsizing
- Social housing?
- Sustainable and energy efficient design
- Limiting Holiday lets/AirBNB

Shop/Hub

- Creating a daytime Meeting Place
- To provide easier access to services e.g. health
- Basics shop/community pantry
- Locally-grown produce

Recreation

- Recreation for play and health
- Activities for young people (goal posts in the park, skate park/pump track)
- Facility for activities for older people during school hours

Environment/Local Energy Production

- Flooding
- Farm diversification/changing land use
- Local energy production
- Electric vehicle charging points

Employment:

- Spaces for small businesses + fast internet

The good news is that many of the community priorities naturally align with those of the National Park and Welsh Government.

LCC and the Place Plan

LCC has a duty under Section 62(2) of the Environment Act to have due regard to the National Park Purposes, which are:

- To conserve and enhance the natural beauty, wildlife and cultural heritage of the National Park.
- To promote opportunities for public understanding and enjoyment of the park.
- To seek to foster the economic and social wellbeing of communities within the park.

While LCC is too small to be bound by the provisions of the Wellbeing of Future Generations Act, this consultation aligns us with its requirement to involve our community and local service providers.

Thanks to:

- All Councillors who have attended Place Plan meetings pop-ups helped set up and pack away, listened to residents and attended small area consultations and working groups.
- Particular thanks to Cllrs Helen Burns, and Gail Jones for inputting vast amounts of data and, with Kate Inglis for reading and analysing past and future policies.
- Cllr Richard Jones for attending more of the small area consultations than anyone else.
- The Clerk, Kay Bailey for pulling together the Matrix of Concerns with Cllr Sam Ady.
- Kate Inglis for design and attending the 5-Councils Crickhowell Place Plan meeting.
- Residents Paul Jackson, Ann Gibson, Morgan Llewellyn, Sue Simpson, Kelly Mulholland, Clare Beatty, Alison Lawrence, Ruth Peddar for organising small area walkabouts

Next Steps:

- Continue to collate the information and feed into subject groups or pass on to responsible authorities as appropriate.
- Cllr Ann Williams to organise a small area meeting in Lime Trees with resident Nell Batson.
- Small area meetings in Clos Cillau/Plas Derwen/Tan Derwen, Canal Close/Chapel Fields (Date TBC) and the Village Centre (September 25th 18.30 to be attended)
- Identify ways to reach more young people, businesses, farmers, and residents of Hillside.
- Create a report of all the findings and circulate it to all stakeholders previously identified for comment.

Conclusion:

This has been a significant public response with an expectation of active engagement of 25%+ of the population of Llangattock. This level of response is better than usual when asking the public to consider the future of their community and must be attributed to the considerable efforts of a small number of residents and councillors. Cllr Jones expressed the view that is essential for the credibility of the process that Cllrs are visible and seen to be consulting.

It is also important to reach all sections of our community. There are still gaps. If we cannot demonstrate that we have reached all sections of our community, the National Park Authority could refuse to adopt the plan.

Additional motion: That this council wishes to make an application for 'Making a Difference in Powys' grant funding to pay for professional consultants to assist in the visualisation of designs for affordable housing, a village shop and parking and traffic management schemes in the village of Llangattock.
